CASTRO PATROL NEEDS YOUR HELP

It all started as a response to a crisis. Reports of two or three violent robberies with associated sexual assaults in the Castro in 2006 brought a response from more than 100 local residents with the common message, "This should not be happening in our community." Castro Community On Patrol (also known as Castro Patrol or CCOP) was established and for the first two years, nine volunteers formed three patrol teams every Friday and Saturday night to watch over the safety of friends, neighbors, and visitors.

The original issue quickly disappeared, but the need for prevention continues for various reasons, including the national political theatre of finding a way to blame the queer community for some new but obscure reason (currently drag performances and trans people) to continue to elect ultra-fascists (rebranded as "conservatives") during the lead-up to the presidential election every four years.

The need for safety patrols continues, but since the pandemic the number of trained CCOP volunteers has dropped to below a dozen. As a result, walking patrols have dropped to one or two per month because we need at least three Patrollers to field a team safely. We still assist with special events such as the Castro Street Fair and the Navy band concert held in Jane Warner Plaza for Fleet Week, but you will often see the same faces each time because of our low number of helpers.

As a result, CCOP has turned its attention to improving personal safety through free or low-cost trainings. One example is the return of our popular Basic Self-Defense workshop, which has trained over 3,000 people through the years. We began delivery of Active Shooter workshops for businesses after the ClubQ Mass shooting in Colorado in 2002. We have a companion Active Shooter workshop for the general public ready, but have been unable to locate enough public interest for such a class so far.

Steve Ayala, a local university student, wrote a research paper in 2008 studying CCOP and similar groups across the nation. He learned that most groups like CCOP failed to survive beyond twelve months. The prime reason was that the original crisis that caused the group to form quickly dissipated and the original volunteers lost interest because there no longer seemed a need. Often, the original threat remained in the background and reappeared in some form later. He found that groups with a longer success changed their focus from being reactive (confronting a specific danger) to proactive (making changes to prevent reoccurrence of similar problems.)

Based on this knowledge, a primary theme of Castro Patrol has been "a visible safety presence." Our teams of three or four people in bright orange uniforms are a deterrent to those seeking to cause harm. A successful patrol is not filled with adventure, but reflects a quiet evening where we help strangers find their way to a train or specific business or come upon someone needing medical assistance. In addition to the walking patrols, we have distributed more than 100,000 safety whistles with instructive literature to help people be more self-aware. Our these is "Take Care of Yourself, Take Care of Your Neighbors."

In order to keep the commitment of time reasonable, a Castro Patrol volunteers is only asked to commit to a single three-hour patrol each month. We have changed the process of training from a pre-scheduled event four times a year to an on-demand, virtual (Zoom) initial session to fit into the potential volunteer's busy life. We gladly train individuals. An even more effective training session involves two or more friends who want to patrol together.

DON'T BE AFRAID, GET TRAINED AND PREPARED

SIX STEPS TO ASSIST IN PROSECUTING CRIMINAL ACTIVITY

IF YOU SEE A CRIME IN PROGRESS, OR A LIFE-THREATENING SITUATION:

CALL - 91

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING SUSPICIOUS OR SOMETHING AUTHORITIES SHOULD KNOW ABOUT:

CALL - 415-553-0123

MEET AND PROVIDE A WITNESS STATEMENT TO POLICE.

If Officers don't see the incident you called about themselves, and find no other criminal activity when they arrive, they cannot CITE or make an ARREST without a witness to the incident.

GET THE COMPUTER AIDED DISPATCH (CAD) NUMBER THAT IS ASSIGNED TO THE INCIDENT

Officers will provide this when you provide your witness statement.

This number will allow you to track the case from investigation to prosecution.

FOLLOW UP WITH SFPD INVESTIGATORS

Call the SFPD Station that responded to your incident and provide the CAD # to get updates on the status of incident.

FOLLOW UP WITH THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Using the CAD#, work with the Assistant District Attorney assigned to the case, and let them know what YOU WANT to happen in the case.

GO TO COURT, AND STAND AS A WITNESS

If the case goes to court, be sure to attend and be willing to provide witness testimony on the stand, and/or victim impact statements.

Castro Community On Patrol (CCOP), a program of San Francisco Safety Awareness For Everyone (SF-SAFE), seeks new volunteers to help patrol the Castro neighborhood on a monthly basis.

CCOP has successfully patrolled the Castro neighborhood since 2006, deploying in teams of three unpaid volunteer Patrollers for a 3-hour shift which they select themselves.

Our patrols provide assistance, information, guidance, and support to the residents, businesses, and visitors of the Castro, interacting with thousands of people every year. We are often "First Reporters" by calling in Medical, Fire, or Law Enforcement professionals when needed, and we will offer assistance when safe to do so until the professionals arrive.

CCOP also assists other community groups to make their events successful, and we are often a part of the developing history of the LGBTQ+ community. In the past we've assisted at PROP8 rallies, Pulse Nightclub memorials, Harvey Milk annual events, and many others. We also assist at regular community events by providing safety teams to events such as the Sisters Easter in the Park, SF PRIDE safety events, Castro Street Fair, CBD Music in the Plaza, SFAF Santa Skivvies Run, PRC Holiday Dinner and many more.

Our volunteers are mostly members of the LGBTQ+ community, but we are open and welcoming to ALL who want to donate just three hours a month to help keep the Castro neighborhood a little safer. We provide full training, and you will always deploy with experienced volunteers. Patrolling is fun, you get to meet lots of people, and you can feel good about helping out the community.
