February Was Busy On Many Fronts For CCOP



As we discussed last month. we are going through the process of establishing CCOP as an independent nonprofit corporation with the City and County of San Francisco, with the State of California, and with the Federal Internal Revenue Service. As you can probably imagine, this involves a lot of research, paperwork, and time. We are not officially registered with the State of California and we are currently working on the IRS nonprofit paperwork.

We have also established "Avenue Greenlight" as our short-term fiscal conduit, allowing us to use their nonprofit status until we can establish our own 501(c)(3) certification from the IRS.

All of this "background" work has been substantial and largely hidden to our volunteers and supporters, but it is essential to securing the long-term future of CCOP.

interesting In an juxtaposition of fate, just as we lost our corporate identity and fiscal capacity with the closing of San Francisco Safety Awareness for Everyone (SF-SAFE) we were also being recognized for our services to the community by the City and County of San Francisco who will present us with a Certificate of Honor for Seventeenvears of service and commitment to the city. This award will take place at the conclusion of the Board of Supervisors meeting on Tuesday March 5, 2024 at City Hall. We invite all of our supporters to join us at 2 PM at the Board of Supervisors meeting as the award is presented. sometime around 2:30 PM

We are also beina recognized by the FBI in the 16th annual Directors Community Liaison awards at the J. Edgar Hoover FBI headquarters in Washington D.C. on Friday April 19, 2024. We have worked closely with the FBI San Francisco Office over the last few years in a number of areas, including our LGBTQ+ Community Safety Program, our Active Shooter training classes, and in our efforts to support the SFPD LGBTQ+ Advisory Forum.

As not everyone will be able

to attend the award ceremony in Washington D.C. the FBI San Francisco Office will host an award ceremony at San Francisco City Hall on Monday March 18th to allow our local supporters to attend and participate. We will post specific time and room number details on our social media as soon as they are confirmed.



In addition to all of this, we also hosted a Community Self-Defense Beginners class on February 17th in the Castro, a private Beginners Self-Defense class at Millennium Tower condominium. and our "Active Shooter – Terrorist Incident Event _ Protection" basic training class on February 28th at the initial request of the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence.

February was quite hectic and busy, and we anticipate March will continue like this as we move forward in establishing our full corporate identify and paperwork, and as we continue to support the community and the many nonprofits we work with. Chief Craig & Chief Carey To Receive FBI Directors Community Liaison Award in Washington D.C.



San Francisco LGBTQ+ Community Safety Program (CSP) leaders, Chief Ken Craig [*pictured left above*] of Community Patrol Service (CPS) and Chief Greg Carey [*pictured right above*] of Castro Community On Patrol (CCOP) have been selected to receive the prestigious Federal Bureau of Investigation Directors Community Liaison award in a special presentation that will take place at the J. Edgar Hoover FBI headquarters in Washington D.C. on Friday April 19, 2024.

The Community Liaison awards are presented annually, and this year represents the 16th iteration of the awards. Each FBI area of responsibility nominates worthy candidates who have worked collaboratively with the local FBI office in furthering the overall mission and goals of the FBI. FBI Director Wray will present the award to Chief Craig and Chief Carey during the gala event in Washington D.C. recognizing them for their tireless work within the San Francisco LGBTQ+ community in providing active shooter training, information, support, and resources to the Castro and surrounding neighborhoods.

Recognizing that not everyone will be able to make the trip to Washington D.C. for the official ceremony, the local FBI San Francisco Office will conduct a local ceremony in San Francisco before the official ceremony in April, to allow local supporters of the CSP program and Chiefs Craig and Carey to come together to congratulate them on this well-deserved award.

The local San Francisco award ceremony is tentatively scheduled for **Monday March 18th** at San Francisco City Hall. Watch our social media for more specific event details.

A HISTORY OF CASTRO COMMUNITY ON PATROL ACCOMPLISHMENTS OVER THE LAST SEVENTEEN YEARS

As CCOP is "born again" as an independent nonprofit corporation in the wake of the SF-SAFE dissolution, I thought it might be appropriate to remind to Patrol volunteers and our supports of some of the accomplishments of CCOP in our Seventeen-year history.

All Patrollers are civilian volunteers who average one three-hour patrol per month. In addition to fielding over 3,400 patrols translating to 10,200 hours of service to San Francisco, CCOP has initiated several other important programs focused on improving personal safety.

CCOP participates in safety planning and assistance with large events including:

- Pink Saturday with the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence (2007-2014)
- Demonstrations and marches related to Prop 8 and DOMA (2008-2012)
- The day-after memorial for victims of the Pulse nightclub shootings (2016)
- Community planning and safety preparations in response to the "Patriot Prayer" group (2017)
- BLM and AAPI events related to violence against POC victims (2020)

CCOP provides crowd and traffic control, often without the need for SFPD involvement, for civic celebrations and memorials. A typical year includes:

- Inscribe event for World AIDS day
- Easter in the Park with the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence (2008 present)
- Harvey Milk birthday and memorial vigil
- Castro Street Fair (2008 present)
- Halloween "Glow in the Streets" block party (2017 present)
- Castro Street Holiday tree lighting
- Castro Menorah lighting ceremony
- Santa's Skivvies Run fundraiser for SFAF (2010 present)
- PCR/AIDS Emergency Fund Christmas eve dinner (2010 2021, currently on hold)

CCOP worked closely with investigators to identify suspects in the few homicides in the Castro, to both help see justice prevail and to serve as a deterrent with the message "if you harm us, we will bring justice." Victims included Freddy Canul-Arguello (2011), Eriq Escolon (2012), and "Feather" Lynn Higgins (2014)

In 2021, CCOP purchased and continues to maintain THREE Automated External Defibrillators (AED) which are distributed throughout the Castro neighborhood, available to ANYONE in response to a cardiac emergency. Two are permanently located at businesses with late-night operating hours and the third is brought to large scale public events by CCOP.

At CCOP we believe the most effective path to public safety is in training members of the public to take care of themselves, take care of their friends, and take care of their community. Since 2010 we have conducted public outreach educational efforts and training classes in the following topics:

- Basic Self-Defense
- Hate Crime awareness
- Active Shooter for individuals and businesses
- First Aid/CPR/AED/NARCAN training
- Event safety monitor training

CCOP firmly believes in collaboration and cooperation to spark change and innovation. As such we have participate in, supported, and volunteer with several governmental and private groups allowing our Patrol Volunteers to influence key decisions and policies such as:

Castro Community On Patrol (CCOP) seeks new volunteers to help patrol the Castro neighborhood on a monthly basis.

CCOP has successfully patrolled the Castro neighborhood since 2006, deploying in teams of three unpaid volunteer Patrollers who walk for a 3-hour shift which they select themselves.

Our patrols provide assistance, distribute information, offer guidance, and deliver support to the residents, businesses, and visitors of the Castro, interacting with thousands of people every year. We are often "First Reporters" by calling in Medical, Fire, or Law Enforcement professionals when needed, and we will offer assistance when safe to do so until the professionals arrive.

CCOP also assists other community groups to make their events successful, and we are often a part of the developing history of the LGBTQ+ community. In the past we've assisted at PROP8 rallies, Pulse Nightclub memorials, Harvey Milk annual events, and many others. We also assist at regular community events by providing safety teams to events such as the Sisters Easter in the Park, SF PRIDE safety events, Castro Street Fair, Glow in the Street events, CBD Music in the Plaza, Santa Skivvies Run, PRC Holiday Dinner and many more.

Our volunteers are mostly members of the LGBTQ+ community, but we are open and welcoming to **ALL** who want to volunteer just three-hours a month to help keep the Castro neighborhood a little safer. We provide full training, and you will always deploy with experienced volunteers. Patrolling is fun, you get to meet lots of people, and you can feel good about helping out the community.
