

May 01 Forum Meeting At UCSF Campus

Also in attendance as invited guests at this meeting was:

Supervisor Matt Dorsey, District 6 Captain Del Gandio opened the meeting with some general comments and turned the floor over to **Supervisor Matt Dorsey** who discussed his time at the Police Department, his decision to Supervisor, the challenges the citv and Police Department faces securing and retaining enough Police Officers to meet the ever-growing needs and expectation of the city, and an in-depth discussion of substance abuse and recovery and the city effort and programs to respond.

The Supervisor discussed his own, very publicly known, prior addiction and recovery and his continuing work and focus in this area to help others find a path out of addiction.

Our Forum members posed some questions to Supervisor related to the Police Commission position that Police should not be focusing on arresting narcotic users on the Supervisor Dorsey said he believes focusing on users is often the thread that law enforcement needs to help those users find treatment and recovery, but also to investigate up to the dealers and gang members.

Forum member Paul Allen presented some data he will provide to the Chief's Police Advisory Forum and the Police Commission which, contrary to popular belief suggests drug related deaths declined from a January and August 2023 peak, and seem to have plateaued.

Forum Members Recognized By The F.B.I.

Forum Community Co-Chair's **Ken Craig** of <u>Community Patrol Service</u> and <u>Greg Carey</u> of <u>Castro Community On Patrol</u> were honored to be recognized by the FBI San Francisco Division for their work on the joint <u>San Francisco LGBTQ+ Community Safety Program</u>. This collaborative program builds safety and security between residents, businesses, private security, and law enforcement agencies. It educates the community about safety measures and supports other LGBTQ+ and neighborhood community organizations and events. The program provided critical Active Shooter training in collaboration with the FBI, Department of Homeland Security, San Francisco District Attorney, San Francisco Police Department, and San Francisco Fire Department with a particular focus on LGBTQ+ bars, clubs, and businesses in the aftermath of the <u>Pulse nightclub</u> and <u>Club Q</u> mass murder incidents.



In advance of the formal FBI ceremony, held at the FBI headquarters in Washington D.C. on April 19th, City and County of San Francisco officials also recognized Chief Craig and Chief Carey and the SF LGBTQ+ CSP at a special ceremony held at San Francisco City Hall on March 18. Mayor London Breed presented Certificates of Honor and FBI Special Agent in Charge of the FBI San Francisco Office presented a Leadership Certificate. Supporting this presentation event was Supervisor Rafael Mandelman, District Attorney Brooke Jenkins, Sheriff Paul Miyamoto, and SFPD Chief Bill Scott.

Our Forum members all contribute significantly to the overall well-being of the LGBTQ+ community within San Francisco, but it is always nice to be recognized for hard work and dedication in such a high-profile way. Congratulations!!

LGBT Law Enforcement Liaison Academy



Our Forum friend, "Out To Protect" provides a LGBT Law Enforcement Liaison Academy designed to help participants design and build a successful program from the ground up. The course content was developed based on a nationwide job task analysis we completed in 2021. Although many law enforcement agencies have an LGBT Liaison, few have anything documented or formalized. This course will not only provide individuals assigned to this role with the knowledge they need, but will also help institutionalize and memorialize the program so that it is sustainable. A certified training program like this one provides credibility for both the individual acting as the Liaison and the program itself.

We call this an "academy" because the course includes three different classes in one. When you enroll in this program, you will complete three classes including:

- LGBT Community Liaison (the master class) 8 hours
- LGBT Awareness Training For Trainers 8 hours
- Hate Crimes Investigations 8 hours

All three components of this program are courses certified by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training. California law enforcement personnel can earn CPT credit.

The following is a list of learning outcomes for the LGBT Law Enforcement Liaison Academy:

- 1. Students will identify the key tasks and responsibilities of an LGBT Liaison.
- 2. Students will develop communication pathways between the LGBT Liaison and community.
- 3. Students will identify key people and community organizations to create relationships and partnership with as an LGBT Liaison.
- 4. Students will create a community event designed to build trust between law enforcement and the LGBTQ+ community.
- 5. Students will demonstrate how to develop and deliver LGBT awareness training for members of law enforcement.
- 6. Students will demonstrate how to identify a hate crime and the basic investigative steps required to prepare a case for prosecution.

The entire academy is available online using the Canvas learning management system. No special software is required, and the course can be accessed from any Windows or Apple device.

This program does more than simply show you how to create a program. The assignments will have you actually building the essential components of a successful program. Course work requires completion of several projects including planning a community event, participation in online discussions, and passing two tests. Participants can expect to spend 24 hours or more completing the academy. Graduates will receive a certificate and an exclusive LGBT Law Enforcement Liaison challenge coin. After completing the course, your Liaison Program will be ready for accreditation.

SFPD SAFE PLACE PROJECT

The "<u>SAFE PLACE</u>" program is a collaborative effort between the San Francisco Police Department and merchants to create safe places where victims of hate crimes, prejudice-based incidents, or other crimes can find refuge and be connected with law enforcement and other services.

The "SAFE ZONE" program was created as a project of our Forum to help persuade members of the LGBTQ+ community that SFPD Police Stations and Officers are safe places for them, and that they can report crimes and concerns to Police and they will be treated with RESPECT and COMPASSION.

We are working with Sgt. Winters, the SFPD LGBTQ+ Liaison to help promote and expand both programs to all areas of the city. Promotion will begin through Community Benefit District and cultural community organizations, as well as efforts to create more public awareness through print and television media resources. We will also reach out to City Supervisors to ask them to promote both programs to their own constituents through their newsletters etc.

This overall project is a broader citywide Safety collaboration with other departments that is being formed as an extension of the SF Police Officers PRIDE Alliance organization.

Many people within the Police Department and within the LGBTQ+ community may be largely unaware of that long and complicated history, and of the tremendous advances and progress that have been made over the decades. This project intends to create our own version of the history art piece shown above, produced by Tasmania Police.

We have started to build our "milestone events" lists and are seeking some SFPD resources to provide statements and memories for the project.

Our long-term goal is to create a finished art installation in the form of a large display which can be housed at the SPFD Training Academy, but also moved to other locations and events when appropriate.

We may be able to secure some funding and artistic assistance from the Police Foundation, and through some connections to similar art projects that are on-going in the Castro and will follow up on these options.

This is an exciting project which will hopefully produce an art piece that will remain interesting and viable for decades of San Franciscan and Police Officers to come.

Help Castro Patrol Recover

Castro Community on Patrol (CCOP) lost all finances including pending City grants when SF-SAFE (it's fiscal sponsor since 2006) came under criminal investigation in January 2024. The result was nearly \$11,000 in unpaid bills and no capital for continued operation. The CCOP Board decided to form its own nonprofit corporation and then rebuild a financial basis to continue its important community services including walking safety patrols, training of the public, and helping other nonprofits develop safety plans. The likelihood of regaining City funding is low for at least the next 2-3 years. In the meantime, CCOP plans to fund its work through private donations and possible corporate grants.
